ABSTRACT

Foundry industry is the mother of all industry and labour is the one of the main backbone of foundry industry. The study covers the overview of foundry industry in India especially Howrah cluster and the problems associated with labour in Howrah cluster using the convenient sampling technique. The study is based on the primary data collected from select foundry units in Howrah cluster. Secondary data from the reports of Foundry Information Centre and different websites have been collected for the study. The parameters for collecting data are social security benefits, job satisfaction and workplace conditions. The statistical tools like Pearson Chi-square test is used for data analysis.
